"The Society for Irish Church Missions...is one instrumentality, capable through the help and blessing of God, of carrying the Gospel to every part of Ireland."


This is still our purpose and passion today.

Why 'new' churches?

For many in Ireland today, the gospel is nothing more than a 'faint memory.'

THE TIDE HAS GONE OUT ON CHRISTIANITY IN IRELAND

There has been a slight increase in those identifying as 'Christian', largely due to the growth in ethnic churches caused by immigration. However, churches in Ireland are all experiencing decline. These churches would have typically relied on generational continuity, but the new Irish have broken with religion. Since our concern is particularly with evangelical churches, it can be said, across the denominational spectrum, evangelical churches continue to fall behind the curve of rising secularism.

28 Bachelors Walk has been central to our recent growth. It provides space for two of our churches on Sunday, mid-week meetings other ICM churches and a training space for various other churches and networks we collaborate with.


However it could be doing so much more.

Given its strategic centre city location if it was repurposed and refurbished it could enable a wider diversity of ministry for ICM churches, open up a greater range of training spaces, resource even more churches across Dublin and create an appealing interface for greater city engagement.



PROJECT 28BW

Building for the future of church planting in Ireland right in the heart of Dublin's centre city.



Essentially the refurbishment of the top three floors into high specification one bedroom, studio apartments will significantly reduce the current and future funding pressure on ICM. These apartments will create a new revenue stream and supply the financial stability we need to fulfil our vision.

The refurbishment of the ground floor of the old ICM building will provide a modern worship space which could also be brought to the rental market accommodating city center meetings and art performances.



And, a refurbished basement would be just what we need for future ICM Training and teaching events, with a well-stocked library of Bible teaching and discipleship resources, laying the foundation for a future church planting hub.

Project 28BW can open the door to a new future for ICM

At present the funding structure for ICM relies heavily on committed donors and legacy gifts. We are very thankful to God for such support, however if we are to multiply church plants and move towards having our own training facility, we will need to diversify our income sources.

From one perspective the refurbishment will create a new revenue stream.

This will allow us to invest more significantly than before in new mission ventures and future church plants.

This can be achieved with a multipurpose ground floor, seminar and break out rooms in the basement, a modern library equipped to help people engage historically and theologically with contemporary issues.

From another perspective, the refurbishment will maximise the current space in 28BW, allowing for the expansion of the vision to establish a training college for the next generation of church planters.

The money flowing from our refurbished centre city premises will:

- Add diversity to the traditional means of funding the ministries of ICM.
- This in turn allows us to be bolder in pushing forward with identifying, recruiting and training more new church planters.
- Long term it lays the foundation for a new Missionary Bible College.
- Together all this means sending out more people, to reach the growing number of unreached in Ireland, to the eternal praise of God from this generation.

Project 28BW has been a long time in preparation...

It has taken almost four years to reach the point where we are now.

The pandemic slowed progress on this project. The conservationist paperwork required even to gain planning permission was significant because 28BW is a listed building both inside and out. **We have this now in full and are ready to progress this project to the next phase.**


Here is a timeline of key activities so far:

Phase 1 (2019-2023)

- O Architect engaged Karol O'Mahony of KoMA (March 2019)
- O Initial round of fundraising for Phase 1 (drawings, certificates, planning permission, QS)
- O Planning permission was granted
- O Preliminary works carried out: including new disabled toilet on ground floor, refurbishment of all 33 windows and fire exit installed in basement.
- O Drawings completed and final bill of quantities produced.
- O Initial tenders sought

Phase 2 (2023-2024)

- Phase 2 Second round of fundraising begins.
- Tenders pursued.
- Third round of fundraising (if necessary)
- O Builders appointed.
- O Works commences hopefully between September 2023 January 2024.





The final bill of quantities has come in at €1.97M. This factors in some contingency planning and is VAT inclusive. It does not include professional fees and is subject to the costings of materials and labour at the time it was produced.

Today we have €333K in our designated building fund, having raised just over €500K in the last 18 months. If we increased the contingency figure in our current estimation and included future professional fees, we are asking for a sum of €2.1M.

Target €2.1M

Our current short fall therefore stands at €1.767M. This is obviously a significant sum of money, but we believe it can be turned into an eternal investment.
